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**NEW BUSINESS SCHEDULED FOR REGULAR MEETING OF MARCH 28, 2017**

**A. RESOLUTION 17-49, A RESOLUTION SETTING FORTH THE REASONS WEST VALLEY CITY WILL NOT ACCEPT THE PROPOSED HOMELESS SHELTER**

Mayor Bigelow presented proposed Resolution No. 17-49 that would set forth the reasons West Valley City will not accept the proposed homeless shelter.

Written information previously provided to the City Council included the following:

The proposed resolution sets forth the reasons why the City Council cannot accept a homeless shelter in West Valley City and directs City staff to resist the placement of such a shelter using all available legal means.

The City has long been a leader in the provision of affordable housing and support services to Utahns in need. West Valley City's commitment to affordable housing, sustainable communities, and long term solutions to homelessness is unparalleled. As set forth in the resolution, the process to locate a new homeless shelter in Salt Lake County is haphazard, rushed, and lacks transparency. This course of action is based on unproven and unsupported speculation and will have generational consequences for our City and our residents. This decision is too important and too damaging to rush through in so little time.

**B. EMPLOYEE OF THE MONTH AWARD, APRIL 2017- RYAN LAVOIE, PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT**

Councilmember Christensen offered to read the nomination of Ryan Lavoie, Parks and Recreation Department, to receive Employee of the Month Award for April 2017. Mr. Lavoie was nominated by Jamie Young.

The nomination reads as follows:

**C. DIVISION OF THE QUARTER AWARD- OPERATIONS, PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT**

Councilmember Lang offered to read the Division of the Quarter Award for the Operations Division in the Public Works Department.

We would like to nominate Operations Division for the division of the quarter because they do a great job at maintaining all city infrastructure and responding to residents requests.

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In the month of December and January our Operations Division had to work extremely hard to get a record snowfall cleaned up. We would especially like to recognize them for extraordinary effort to plow the roads over Christmas and New Year's Eve. Our guys had to work around the clock, during holiday hours, working 12 hour shifts. Sometimes the crews had to repeat the clearing process before they could even move on because the snowfall was so intense. It took a team of supervisors and crew members to work 24 hours a day to snowplow city roads. ### **PUBLIC HEARINGS SCHEDULED FOR APRIL 4, 2017**

#### **A. PUBLIC HEARING, ACCEPT PUBLIC INPUT REGARDING RE-OPENING THE FY 2016-2017 BUDGET**

Mayor Bigelow informed a public hearing had been advertised for the Regular Council Meeting scheduled April 4, 2017, in order for the City Council to hear and consider public comments regarding re-opening the FY 2016-2017 budget.

Proposed Ordinance 17-13 related to the proposal to be considered by the City Council subsequent to the public hearing, was discussed as follows:

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 17-13, AMEND THE BUDGET OF WEST VALLEY CITY FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2016 AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2017 TO REFLECT CHANGES IN THE BUDGET FROM INCREASED REVENUES AND AUTHORIZE THE DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS**

Jim Welch, Finance Director, discussed proposed Ordinance 17-13 that would amend the Budget of West Valley City for the Fiscal Year Beginning July 1, 2016 and Ending June 30, 2017 to Reflect Changes in the Budget from Increased Revenues and Authorize the Disbursement of Funds.

Written documentation previously provided to the City Council included Information as follows:

State Statute Title 10, Chapter 6, Utah Code Annotated 1953, as amended, allows the City of West Valley to amend its budget during the year. The West Valley City holds public hearings on budget amendments on a quarterly basis each fiscal year.

A Public Notice was posted March 23, 2017 in (the Salt Lake Tribune and the Deseret Morning News) general circulation to the general public. Notice was given that a public hearing is to be held April 4, 2017 at 6:30 p.m., West Valley City Hall, 3600 Constitution Blvd., West Valley City, Utah.

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Mayor Bigelow clarified where various funding sources come from. Councilmember Lang asked how the skate park funding applies to this fiscal year and the Council discussed. The Mayor questioned specific budget lines and Mr. Welch clarified. Councilmember Lang questioned the fire station funding and Mr. Welch and Mr. Pyle clarified.

Upon inquiry, there were no further questions or concerns expressed by members of the City Council.

The City Council will hold a public hearing and consider proposed ordinance No. 17-13 at the Regular Council Meeting scheduled April 4, 2017, at 6:30 P.M.

### **ORDINANCE NO. 17-14, AMEND SECTION 3-18-103 OF THE WEST VALLEY CITY MUNICIPAL CODE TO ALLOW ADDITIONAL MEMBERS OF THE PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS REVIEW BOARD**

Wayne Pyle, City Manager, discussed proposed ordinance 17-14 that would amend Section 3-18-103 of the West Valley City Municipal Code to allow additional members of the Professional Standards Review Board.

Written documentation previously provided to the City Council included Information as follows:

The PSRB is an independent citizen oversight board that reviews the City's policing practices and offers feedback, information, and suggestions to City staff and the City Council. In addition to the annual report submitted by the PSRB, the PSRB reviews all uses of force, pursuits, internal affairs investigations, and complaints against officers, regardless of how major or minor the allegation may be.

The PSRB is currently limited to seven members with no alternate member. This ordinance permits the appointment of additional members to assist the PSRB in transacting business when members are absent and allow additional citizen engagement. The ordinance also makes technical changes to language to reflect the current composition of the PSRB.

Councilmember Buhler asked if there is an intention to have no minimum number of members on the board. He stated he doesn't feel comfortable leaving this open. Mr. Pyle stated that he would suggest a minimum of 5. The Council agreed. Councilmember Lang questioned if there should be a maximum. Mr. Bunderson stated that he doesn't see this being a concern and added that the Council, if they feel there are too many members being added, can deny the ratification of new members as they are proposed by resolution.

Upon inquiry, there were no further questions or concerns expressed by members of the City Council.

**RESOLUTION NO. 17-45, AUTHORIZE THE EXECUTION OF AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN WEST VALLEY CITY AND CRAIG BUSCHMANN TO PROVIDE ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SERVICES TO WEST VALLEY CITY**

Eric Bunderson, City Attorney, discussed proposed resolution 17-45 that would authorize the execution of an Agreement Between West Valley City and Craig Buschmann to provide Administrative Law Judge Services to West Valley City.

Written documentation previously provided to the City Council included Information as follows:

This contract awards a non-exclusive one year term to Craig Buschmann to be an Administrative Law Judge (“ALJ”) for West Valley City. The contract sets forth the duties to include all ACE hearings, parking tickets and other matters as assigned by the West Valley City Administration. The contract allows for the City to dismiss Mr. Buschmann for cause and either side to rescind the contract with 30 days written notice. The rate of pay is \$45 per hour, and the contract does not guarantee a minimum number of hours or any exclusivity.

Councilmember Buhler asked if the City only has one Administrative Law Judge. Eric replied yes but added that the City also has one hearing officer.

Upon inquiry, there were no further questions or concerns expressed by members of the City Council.

**RESOLUTION NO. 17-46, AWARD A CONTRACT TO CODY EKKER CONSTRUCTION FOR THE MARKET STREET UTILITY RELOCATION PROJECT**

Russ Willardson, Public Works Director, discussed proposed resolution 17-46 that would award a Contract to Cody Ekker Construction for the Market Street Utility Relocation Project.

Written documentation previously provided to the City Council included Information as follows:

Bids were opened for the project on March 14, 2017. A total of five (5) bids were received. The lowest responsible bidder was Cody Ekker Construction.

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Many of the utilities that service Market Street, north of Lehman Avenue are located within the old alignment of Market Street, upon which is proposed to build a new public safety building. This project is being built to relocate storm drain, sewer and other miscellaneous utilities out into the current roadway alignment.

Cody Ekker Construction was the lowest responsible bidder. It is recommended that the project be awarded to Cody Ekker Construction

Councilmember Buhler asked why this bid is significantly lower than the rest of those submitted. Mr. Willardson replied that the City has confidence in the bidder and feels the company will do a good job. Councilmember Christensen asked if BRT will be detoured while this project is being worked on. Mr. Willardson replied yes.

Upon inquiry, there were no further questions or concerns expressed by members of the City Council.

**CONSENT AGENDA SCHEDULED FOR APRIL 4, 2017**

**A. RESOLUTION 17-47, AUTHORIZE THE CITY TO ACCEPT A GRANT OF TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENT FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF GRANITE SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR PROPERTY LOCATED AT 6744 WEST 3800 SOUTH (PARCEL 14-34-251-002)**

Mayor Bigelow discussed proposed Resolution No. 17-47 that would authorize the City to accept a Grant of Temporary Construction Easement from the Board of Education of Granite School District for property located at 6744 West 3800 South (Parcel 14-34-251-002).

Written information previously provided to the City Council included the following:

The Board of Education of Granite School District property located at 6744 West 3800 South is one of the properties affected and benefitted by the 6800 West Orchard Elementary Improvements Project. This project will include the installation of curb, gutter, sidewalk and other related improvements on the east side of 6800 West and a portion of 3800 South adjacent to Orchard Elementary School. It will also include the installation of a drive approach on 6800 West, and removing a drive approach on 3800 South.

Upon inquiry by Mayor Bigelow, the Council had no further questions or concerns.

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**B. RESOLUTION 17-48, AUTHORIZE THE CITY TO ACCEPT A GRANT OF TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENT FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF GRANITE SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR PROPERTY LOCATED AT 3275 WEST 3100 SOUTH (PARCEL 15-29-427-051)**

Mayor Bigelow discussed proposed Resolution No. 17-48 that would authorize the City to accept a Grant of Temporary Construction Easement from the Board of Education of Granite School District for property located at 3275 West 3100 South (Parcel 15-29-427-051).

Written information previously provided to the City Council included the following:

The Granite School District property located at 3275 West 3100 South is one of the properties affected and benefitted by the Tess Avenue Sidewalk Project. This project will include the installation of sidewalk, new curb and gutter, and other related improvements on portions of Tess Avenue and Lee Ann Street to provide safer pedestrian access to Hillsdale Elementary School. It will also include the installation of drive approaches, and textured, colored concrete park strip between the curb and the new sidewalk.

Upon inquiry by Mayor Bigelow, the Council had no further questions or concerns.

The City Council will consider proposed Resolutions No. 17-47 and 17-48 at the Regular Council Meeting scheduled April 4, 2017, at 6:30 P.M.

**COMMUNICATIONS**

**A. PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS REVIEW BOARD ANNUAL REPORT**

Abby Dizon-Maughan, Chair for the West Valley City Professional Standards Review Board, provided an annual report summarized as follows:

This annual report summarizes the activities of the Professional Standards Review Board during 2016. This report is required by West Valley City Municipal Code Section 3-18-109(3) and is made by the Board in compliance with those requirements.

**I. Summary of 2016 Activities**

In addition to its role in reviewing the activities and practices of the West Valley City Police Department, the PSRB has offered the public twelve opportunities in open meetings to voice comments and concerns regarding policing issues in West Valley City. While the PSRB was disappointed to lose long-serving and dedicated

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members, the PSRB welcomed Duane Mueller and John O'Donnell to the Board and has found their expertise invaluable.

The PSRB was deeply saddened at the November 6, 2016 passing of Officer Cody Brotherson. Officer Brotherson was a son of West Valley City and, sadly, he lost his life serving our community in a way matched by few and exceeded by none. His sacrifice is a humbling reminder of the service rendered by our police officers and the risks they take every day to make our City a safe, welcoming community. His life and legacy will not be forgotten by the PSRB.

### II. Cases Reviewed in 2016

The data summarized in this report includes all cases reviewed by the PSRB in 2016. The quarterly reports for all four quarters are attached for further information and detail.

#### A. Response to Resistance

During 2016, the Board found two instances of officers violating department policy concerning responses to resistance and uses of force. In both cases, the policy violated concerned proper radio protocol to be followed at the initiation of a pursuit. The Board has recommended increased training and counseling regarding safe and effective pursuits and, as summarized below, will make a similar recommendation again. Although the two pursuits in question were conducted safely, complete compliance with pursuit protocol is essential to ensure that pursuits are as safe and effective as possible.

#### B. Allegations of Misconduct

During 2016, the PSRB sustained a total of 25 allegations against officers alleged to have violated department policy. In the vast majority of cases, the violations were of a relatively minor nature and required only additional training or counseling from superiors. Where further discipline was required, the PSRB concurred with departmental recommendations.

The PSRB expects all officers to conduct themselves in an appropriate, professional manner and has seen this expectation met in the overwhelming majority of cases. However, the PSRB

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reminds officers and the community at large that any instance where officers fall short does not reflect well on the City or on the police force and that the department should be continually striving to do better in building relationships within the department and with our citizens.

### III. Public Meetings

A public meeting was held each month of 2016, generally on the second Thursday of the month. Citizens have been offered the opportunity to make any comments or voice any concerns regarding policing issues in West Valley City. These meetings will be continued in 2017 and the PSRB encourages citizens to attend and make their voices heard.

### IV. Discussion and Recommendations

#### A. Fourth Amendment Discussion and Training

In many cases reviewed by the PSRB, officers are faced with decisions about uses of force or searches that implicate Fourth Amendment concerns. The PSRB acknowledges that officers are trained extensively, both at POST and internally, concerning Fourth Amendment requirements and the importance of observing the limitations imposed thereby. The PSRB feels that additional training for Board members would be useful to help the PSRB understand the dynamic situations faced by officers and recommend different approaches to situations where appropriate.

Additionally, Fourth Amendment jurisprudence is rapidly changing, with relevant developments in case law in Utah as well as across the nation. The PSRB feels that it will be more effective in reviewing officer conduct if it is armed with a more complete picture of this rapidly changing field.

#### B. Pursuit Procedures and Enhanced Training

As in 2015, the only uses of force reviewed by the PSRB that were out of policy involved failures to comply with vehicle pursuit procedures. These policy violations did not endanger officers or suspects, but the PSRB is mindful of the extreme importance of safety with regard to vehicle pursuits, particularly given the dynamic environment inherent to a pursuit.

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The PSRB has observed improvement in pursuits and pursuit training and applauds the department for this improvement. However, the PSRB would like to see additional training to enable officers to follow policy at all times. If current policies are impractical in the context of a pursuit, the PSRB would encourage a review of policy to match the practices that are most effective in the field.

### C. Streamlined Process for Review of Internal Affairs Investigations and Complaints

The PSRB has been pleased with the quality of information and the thorough nature of internal affairs investigations of allegations against officers. However, it is frequently long after an incident when the PSRB receives an investigation for review, making it more difficult to conclude the process in a timely fashion. The PSRB encourages the department to establish a firmer timetable for reporting of investigations to the PSRB and to report on circumstances when the department is unable to meet that timetable.

### D. Increased Data Gathering

The PSRB encourages the department to gather additional data concerning the citizens who are involved in uses of force and responses to resistance. Where possible, demographic traits such as race should be tracked in order to determine whether certain groups are more likely to be involved in a use of force as compared to the general population arrested or encountered by police. This data could be useful in determining whether additional training or emphasis is necessary to build trust within the community.

### E. Broader Review of Uses of Force

The PSRB's review of uses of force is the most comprehensive and complete in the state of Utah. In addition to existing situations reviewed by the PSRB, the PSRB recommends that forced entries into homes or vehicles, displays or uses of spikes or other tools to immobilize vehicles, and uses or displays of OC, batons, or K9 officers be reviewed as well. The PSRB believes that these situations are analogous to those currently reviewed and feels that these inclusions would ensure that the PSRB's review remains the most comprehensive possible.

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**F. Additional Community Outreach**

As was the case last year, the PSRB is disappointed that more citizens have not chosen to become involved with the PSRB. The PSRB recommends that the City's public relations staff consider undertaking initiatives to publicize the work of the PSRB, the PSRB's public meetings, and opportunities for citizens to become more involved. Chief Russo's meetings with residents have been both popular and effective and the PSRB feels that additional resources invested into publicizing the work of the PSRB would serve the community well.

The Council discussed specific language and requests that are being presented by the PSRB. Members of the Council thanked Abbey for her work and the work of the rest of the Board.

**B. COUNCIL UPDATE**

Mayor Bigelow referenced a Memorandum previously received from the City Manager that outlined upcoming meetings and events.

Members of the City Council had no further questions regarding the Council Update.

**NEW BUSINESS**

**A. POTENTIAL FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS**

Councilmember Lang stated that funds accrued throughout the year should be used to avoid a tax increase. Wayne discussed the logistics of this and indicated more information will follow.

**B. COUNCIL REPORTS**

**COUNCILMEMBER LANG- SPECIAL DISTRICTS BILL**

Councilmember Lang stated a new bill that was passed at the Legislature requires special districts to report tax increases to effected municipalities. She stated that if this occurs, the City should expect visits from its special districts.

**C. REVIEW AGENDA FOR REGULAR REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY, HOUSING AUTHORITY, AND MUNICIPAL BUILDING AUTHORITY MEETINGS SCHEDULED APRIL 4, 2017**

Wayne Pyle indicated that these are regularly scheduled meetings. He stated that there are no budgets items and no items schedules but meeting meetings minutes.

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**MOTION FOR EXECUTIVE SESSION**

Councilmember Christensen moved to adjourn and reconvene in an Executive Session for discussion of pending litigation. Councilmember Nordfelt seconded the motion.

A voice vote was taken and all members voted in favor of the motion.
