In addition to the city's bulky waste removal service, West Valley City will provide two drop off locations for residents to dispose of Christmas trees to be

reused or recycled for mulch.

Dumpsters will be available December 26th through January 7 at City Park (4500 West 3500 South) and West View Park (6100 West 4100 South). Trees must be free of lights, stands, nails, screws, bags and decorations before being placed in dumpsters. No artificial trees will be accepted and no other trash is allowed in the dumpsters.

Petsafe Howlidays

Can you believe it? The holiday season is here once more! Good thing we dogs don't have to run around shopping like you do. Here are some tips for a safe, healthy, peaceful holiday season with your pets:

- 1. Pets are not presents; they are members of your family who need a lifetime commitment from you. Please don't give an animal as a gift only to become tired or overwhelmed a few months later and end up taking it to the shelter. If you are home during the holidays and this seems like the best time to welcome a new pet into your family, adopting saves lives.
- Please remember that if a pet is living outdoors, Utah law requires that they have adequate shelter, unfrozen water, and food.
- 3. Though the holidays are a busy time, dogs still need exercise, so please keep walking us!
- 4. If you have a Christmas tree, pets can get overly curious and end up hurt. Stabilize your tree so your pet doesn't knock it over. Ensure all lights or electrical decorations are connected to a safe power source. Keep wires, glass or plastic ornaments, and batteries out of their reach. Pets can try to eat tinsel and end up blocking their intestines, so it's best to avoid it.
- 5. The ASPCA reminds us

- that mistletoe and holly can cause digestive upset and cardiovascular problems in dogs, and kidney distress in cats; it's best to avoid these around your pets. PetMD adds that poinsettias can be toxic too, so keep them out of reach. The same goes for tree sap.
- 6. Pets like to feel included, so giving holiday toys and treats is great! Just be sure to choose safe treats and toys that your pet will not choke on. Did you know rawhide, for example, can cause intestinal obstructions and even result in emergency surgery?
- Keep the chocolate away from pets for their own good. The same goes for alcoholic drinks.
- 8. Make sure pets have a safe space where they can retreat if they get overwhelmed by visitors or all the chaos of holiday celebrations, gift unwrapping, etc.
- 9. If you are traveling, be sure your pets are properly cared for in your absence.
- 10. Having your pet's nametag, license, rabies tag, and microchip up-to-date is important to safeguard them in case they get confused or lost during travels, or even frightened if there are fireworks or poppers on New Year's Eve. Plan ahead so you can keep your pet safe.

What better reason to celebrate than having the unconditional love, companionship, and good company of your furry family members as part of your holiday festivities? I hope this season will be a joyous one!
