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TO THE CITIZENS OF WEST VALLEY CITY

We are proud to present the West Valley City's Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018. This report gives readers a summary of the City's financial activities. The purpose of the PAFR is to report the City's financial information in a clear, concise manner, giving all readers, both financial and non-financial, an understanding of where the revenue comes from and where dollars are being spent. Most importantly, it is essential that our citizens understand the key services that the City provides to make West Valley City a safer and more enjoyable place in which to work, live, and play.

The PAFR summarizes the financial activities of the City for our fiscal year which runs from July 1 to June 30. It is drawn from a more detailed report called the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). The CAFR includes financial statements that are prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and audited by Keddington & Christensen, P.C., an independent auditing firm. The 2018 CAFR has received an unmodified (clean) opinion. The numbers contained within the CAFR were acquired by applying the basis of accounting principles as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

Although the numbers used in the PAFR come from an audited source, we have presented them in a condensed, easy to understand, non-GAAP format. GAAP reports deal with the presentation of segregated funds as well as full disclosure of all material financial and non-financial events in notes to the financial statements, while non-GAAP reports do not contain such notes. Citizens who wish to review audited GAAP basis financial statements can refer to the West Valley City's CAFR, which is available from the Finance Department or on the City's website at wvc-ut.gov.

As a municipality, we want to continue awareness, accountability, and transparency of the City's financial information. We anticipate that after reading the PAFR, community members will be reassured that public dollars are being used to build a better, safer, and stronger West Valley City. With the help of all departments, the City, in 2018 has accomplished many goals. All these positive achievements have helped to increase growth and success in our City. We look forward to the future and growth of the City.



STATEMENT OF NET POSITION

The City's governmental activities increased \$5.9 million in total net position, which represents a 2.0% increase from the prior year's net position. The City's business-type activities decreased \$1.2 million in total net position, which represents a 1.6% decrease from the prior year's net position. The City as a whole increased total net position by \$4.8 million, which is a 1.3% increase from the prior year. 
Net Position measures the net financial resources available as a result of City operations to pay expenditures in future periods. Rating agencies examine net positions when considering the overall economic health and creditworthiness of the City. Net position here means the balance of governmental funds calculated in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Independent Audit



STATEMENT OF ACTIVITIES

Governmental revenues decreased from the previous year, by \$8,598,738 or 6.6%. The overall decrease was due to a decrease of \$11,827,016 in capital grants and contributions for City infrastructure improvements. Property taxes increased by \$1,182,407 or 3.6%, primarily due to an increase in the City's tax base. Sales taxes increased by \$1,580,165, or 6.2%. Other revenues had relatively minor increases or decreases.


Governmental activities expenditures increased by \$7,433,443, or 6.8%. General government expenditures increased by \$7,178,197 due to non-capital purchases of computer and communications equipment and a shift of some expenditures previously included in public safety. This was a corresponding factor in the decrease in public safety expenditures; overall public safety expenditures decreased by \$6,739,535, or 22.0%. Highways and public improvements increased by \$13,111,800 due to a shift in expenditures from Parks and recreation, as well as increased funding for significant maintenance projects. Parks and recreation expenditures decreased by \$4,560,973, or 24.8%, returning to historically typical levels. Other governmental activities showed minor increases or decreases attributable to normal variances in operating expenditures.

In business-type activities, overall revenues showed a modest increase of \$369,943, or 2.7%. Overall expenses increased by \$291,100. Although the City's golf courses experience some year to year variance, overall the City's business-type activities are relatively stable in generating revenues and expenses.

GENERAL FUND


WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the City and supports day-to-day operations. By law, the City may only have one general fund. This chart is a comparison of the General Fund total revenues by category. As seen here, sales tax revenues continue to increase as we welcome new businesses to West Valley City and as the economy continues to grow.



General Fund Revenue by Source



WHERE THE MONEY GOES







CAPITAL ASSETS & BUSINESS TYPE ACTIVITIES


DEBT SUMMARY

General Obligation Bonds: A General Obligation bond is a municipal bond backed by the credit and taxing power of the city, rather than revenue from a specific project. West Valley City does not use General Obligation bonds as a source of funding.

Revenue Bonds (Lease Revenue, Sales Tax Revenue, Etc.): Revenue bonds are municipal bonds backed by revenue from a specific project or revenue stream - such as sales tax, utility taxes, or lease revenue from a new building.

Capital Leases: West Valley City uses capital leases to purchase equipment such as police laptops & radios, IT software & servers, and even emergency vehicles. Capital leases spread the cost of these purchases over the life of the equipment & vehicles.

Notes Payable: A note payable is a promise to pay a specific amount of money at a future date(s).


